Zelenskyy praises Scranton, DOD for Ukraine support

SCRANTON, Pa. - There was a buzz both inside and outside the Scranton Army Ammunition Plant on Sunday afternoon, as Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy toured the facility. Zelenskyy expressed his gratitude to the U.S. Army and to the workers of the plant for the crucial role they play providing support to his country amidst its ongoing conflict with Russia. "I have heard that 400 people work here, but I wanted very much to come here and to thank you. Four hundred people have saved millions of Ukrainians," Zelenskyy said.
