### Army Community Service Helps a Veteran Obtain His U.S. Citizenship

John Benedict was born in Czechoslovakia in 1946. He migrated with his parents to America when he was 11 months old and lived in New York City. When Mr. Benedict was 7 years old, his parents became naturalized citizens.

At the age of 19, Mr. Benedict joined the United States Army. Serving in the Army was a dream come true for Mr. Benedict. He served 3 tours in Vietnam, and served an additional 3 years.

He loved being a Soldier and proudly served America and the U.S. Army. Upon completing his tour and serving honorably, he was discharged. When Mr. Benedict joined the Army, he was told that serving in the military would automatically make him an American citizen.

He paid several thousand dollars to Legal Services for assistance to obtain his citizenship. However, on a fixed income, Mr. Benedict couldn't afford to pay additional legal fees.

His paperwork for citizenship was never completed. He sought help from the Veteran Affairs Office and was referred to Fort Campbell Army Community Service (ACS) for assistance.

Mrs. Young conducted an assessment of his case and reached out to the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) Office Military Help Line for legal advice on his behalf.

Mr. Benedict was surprised to find out because of his veterans' status he did not need to pay for his application for Certificate of Citizenship. Mrs. Young reviewed his application, ensured it was completed accurately and all supporting documents were submitted to the USCIS in Memphis.

She conducted several follow ups throughout the year with USCIS in Memphis and after 53 years, Mr. Benedict has officially become an American citizen last month.

Mr. Benedict was excited and immediately went to the Social Security Office to replace his social security card and to the County Clerk's Office to become a registered voter.
Mr. Benedict is thankful to ACS Relocation Program and Mary Young for their assistance in helping him obtain his Citizenship, but most of all he is proud and honored to be an American.

# Why Have a Family Readiness Group (FRG)?

Let us start by looking at the name of the group - Family Readiness; the name alone tells us that the mission of this group is to help the Family to be ready; but ready for what?

The main purpose of an FRG, is to educate Families on the resources available to them as military Families. This is an on-going education and mentoring process.

The Army presents its own unique challenges for Soldiers and their Families. Soldiers have to be trained and ready to complete the mission and Family members need the information and skills to be able to support their Soldiers.

The FRG is a part of the Army's Family Readiness System (FRS). The FRS is a network of programs and services that is in place to help improve the quality of life of Service members and their Families.



According to Army Regulation 608-1 Appendix J; J-1 (b) the FRG is a command-sponsored organization of Soldiers, civilian employees, Family members,

(immediate and extended) and volunteers belonging to a unit.

FRGs will provide mutual support and assistance, and a network of communications among the Family members, the chain of command, and community resources.

Family members who are confident in navigating the resources available to them are able to better face the challenges that can arise and thrive during deployments, thus allowing their Soldiers to stay focused on the mission.
